- **Key Insight**: Forgiveness is a non-negotiable aspect of Christian living, modeled after Christ's example. Unforgiveness is not only a sin but also a hindrance to spiritual growth and unity in the body of Christ.

4. Matthew 18:28-30 (NKJV):

- "But that servant went out and found one of his fellow servants who owed him a hundred denarii; and he laid hands on him and took him by the throat, saying, 'Pay me what you owe!' So his fellow servant fell down at his feet and begged him, saying, 'Have patience with me, and I will pay you all.' And he would not, but went and threw him into prison till he should pay the debt."
- **Key Insight**: This parable highlights the hypocrisy and severity of refusing to forgive others after receiving forgiveness. It illustrates the bondage that unforgiveness brings to the unforgiving person.

5. Matthew 18:33-35 (NKJV):

- "Should you not also have had compassion on your fellow servant, just as I had pity on you?' And his master was angry, and delivered him to the torturers until he should pay all that was due to him. So My heavenly Father also will do to you if each of you, from his heart, does not forgive his brother his trespasses.'"
- Key Insight: This continuation of the parable shows the divine expectation of forgiveness and the dire consequences of failing to meet that standard, underscoring the critical nature of mercy in the Christian life.

6. Luke 17:2 (NKJV):

- "It would be better for him if a millstone were hung around his neck, and he were thrown into the sea, than that he should offend one of these little ones."
- **Key Insight**: This verse emphasizes the severe consequences of causing offense, especially to the vulnerable, illustrating the profound responsibility believers have to avoid leading others into sin.

Practical Applications:

- Avoiding the Trap of Offense: Be vigilant in recognizing and avoiding the bait of offense. When tempted, choose unity and forgiveness over division and resentment.
- **Forgiving Others Quickly**: Forgive offenses promptly to prevent bitterness from taking root and leading to spiritual bondage.
